Alicia Ostriker has published seventeen volumes of poetry, as well as books of critical work on American poetry and the Bible. Twice a National Book Award finalist and twice a National Jewish Book Award winner, her poetry has appeared in The New Yorker, American Poetry Review, The Atlantic, Paris Review, Ontario Review, The New Republic, Best American Poetry, The Pushcart Anthology, and many other journals and anthologies, and has been translated into numerous languages.

THURSDAY, MARCH 17 Paisley **Rekdal**

Paisley Rekdal is the author of several books of nonfiction, including a hybrid-genre photo-text memoir. She is also the author of six books of poetry and the recipient of numerous prestigious fellowships and awards. Her poems and essays have appeared in top literary journals and on National Public Radio, among other places. A Distinguished Professor of English at the University of Utah, she guest edited *The Best American Poetry* 2020 anthology and is currently Utah's poet laureate.

Tim Seibles is the author of six collections of poetry, including *Fast Animal* (2012), which won several awards and was nominated for a 2012 National Book Award. His poems have been published in numerous literary journals and anthologies, including *Best American Poetry*. Seibles lives and teaches at Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Virginia.


