About A Brief History of Fruit: In Kimberly Quiogue Andrews's award-winning full-length debut, we are shuttled between the United States and the Philippines in the search for a sense of geographical and racial belonging. Colonization, class dynamics, an abiding loneliness, and a place's titular fruit—tiny Filipino limes, the frozen berries of rural America—all serve as focal markers in a book that insists that we hold life's whole fragrant pollination in our hands and look directly at it, bruises and all. Throughout, these searching, fiercely intelligent and formally virtuostic poems offer us a vital new perspective on biracial identity and the meaning of home, one that asks us again and again: "what does it mean, really, to live in a country?"
